OUR STORY SO FAR

OUR MISSION

Our mission remains the same: We help the cannabis industry and its consumers to repair harms of the War on Drugs.

After the murder of George Floyd in 2020, many cannabis companies suggested they would invest in Black and Brown communities that have been, and still are, disproportionately harmed by the War on Drugs.

Diversity, Equity, & Inclusion officers were hired, internal antibias trainings booked, and press releases issued.

Now, three years later, little of those efforts remain. The industry's promises have once again rung hollow, and Cage-Free has chosen to move toward self-sufficiency, in the form of a worker-owned cooperative.

CUMULATIVE IMPACT

Since launching in 2017, we have assisted in record clearance, youth job development, reentry programs, cannabis industry research, and other aspects of repairing harms of the War on Drugs.

We've done so with the guidance and participation of directly-impacted individuals and communities, often through organizations like these:



















BY THE NUMBERS

- 60,000+ records cleared or sealed
- \$670 million public benefit created
- Over **8,400** people served in person
- 3 reports co-authored
- 1 worker-owned cooperative developed

CO-OPERATIVE TRANSFORMATION

Since late 2021, Cage-Free Cannabis has been working with the L.A.

Co-op Lab as we convert our for-profit side into a worker-owned co-operative.

In 2022, we refined our business model, budget, and pitch with the help of our Advisory Board.

In 2023, our conversion will be completed. All of Cage-Free's staff and advisory board will become co-owners - and we will establish a pathway for community members to become co-owners as well.

YOUTH PROGRAMS

Since our launch in 2017, we have centered the voices and needs of young people because they are still most at risk of being criminalized for cannabis use.







CROSS-COUNTRY CONVERSATION

In 2022, we began an online dialogue between young people in Los Angeles and the Bronx. At the time, the State of New York was legalizing adult-use cannabis, and we wanted young people in California to be able to share their experiences of a regulated industry.

Participating organizations included Youth Justice Coalition, Blue Dream Radio, and All The Jive NYC.

These events were hosted by Faith Garcia and Tauheedah Shakur - and they allowed us to amplify the voices and work of organizers around the U.S.


Our live conversations examine the intersections between cannabis and other aspects of people's lives.







